

Give careful consideration as to when you speak to your child about their day. Straightaway when you collect them is not always the best time. This is the time for reconnections—big hugs, smiles - you are just so happy to see them at the end of their school day! Sometimes on your way home, whilst you're doing the dishes, preparing the evening meal, doing something together or going for a walk can be better times to ask your child about their day.
