We are always seeking ways to improve provision in our school so our children receive the best experience we can offer. We know that school can be an anxious time for some children for lots of different reasons and sometimes these anxieties can be short-lived and triggered at different times. We have a lot of support already in place but would like to further enhance this.

As such we are exploring the possibility of a therapy dog. Many schools use therapy dogs and report the many advantages the children have gained as result. The use of a therapy dog within our school will support children's development of empathy skills, as well as social skills. Children will learn that they need to adjust their behaviours to consider the needs of others ,in this case the therapy dog. In addition therapy dogs can have a calming effect and support relationships within school. Research has indicated that therapy dogs have a direct impact on the following:

- Building confidence
- * Alleviating anxiety, resulting in improved learning outcomes
- Improved relationships with peers and staff alike
- Increased motivation and readiness for learning

With the above in mind, I would like to introduce you all to Nelly. Nelly is a trained therapy dog who belongs to Mrs Tye, our Deputy Headteacher. Mrs Tye has kindly offered us the opportunity to host Nelly in our school. Nelly will be visiting our school on Friday for one hour only and will meet with a small group of children in order to ease her in gently. We are hoping that Nelly will be a good match for our school and if this is the case, we will slowly increase her time at the school. A thorough risk assessment is in place for her visit and subsequent visits. You will be receiving a letter requesting permission for your child to work with Nelly hopefully in the future. We hope that she will be a welcome addition to our therapeutic provision and that our school community will see the benefits of having her with us.


