Children under seven years old should:

- not be out alone
- Always be accompanied by a responsible adult.

Please speak to our child about the Green Cross Code:

To follow the code, they must:

- find a safe place to cross
- stand on the pavement near the kerb
- look all round for traffic and listen
- if traffic is coming let it pass then look all round again
- when there is no traffic near, walk straight across the road
- keep looking and listening for traffic while crossing

When walking with your child, please remember that you are role models for crossing the road safely. Use pedestrian and zebra crossings rather than trying to make your way through busy traffic to cross roads. Ensure that you are not using your mobile phone device when crossing the road, children must see that your full attention is on the road.




### Rose class
