Science VR Workshop



On Friday morning, Rose Class were treated to a VR workshop learning opportunity for Science: The environment (and how we can conserve our environment). This was a phenomenal experience. It was genuinely an exciting way to start our Friday!



Many of our children have access to mobile phones at home and are able to access the internet from these devices. The internet can be a great place for learning however it can also be a space presenting real danger for children and exposure to content that may be harmful. In addition, children are often using social media platforms to have general discussions about school, friendship etc but at times these are also harmful when children engage in exchanging unpleasant comments about each other or other children/adults.—online bully-ing.



TikTok is another popular platform with an age rating of 13+. Children in key stage 2 are using this app often without the knowledge of their parents/carers. As with many platforms, it has its merits in terms of learning about video editing and discovering interesting facts but it is also very easy to access inappropriate content. There is also a messaging feature allowing users to privately message each other sometimes with people they do not know. We want our children to be up to date with the technological world in which they will become young adults however it is incredibly important that we all ensure that they can do this safely.

Below are some tips for keeping your child safe on TikTok taken from the NSPCC page:

How to keep your child safe on TikTok using safety settings

There are six security settings that can help you to keep TikTok safe for your child and prevent them seeing anything that might worry or upset them:

- 1. **Family Pairing** This allows you to connect your child's account with your own. It gives you access to parental controls to help manage who they can speak to and how long they can spend on the app.
- 2. **Private account**Setting your child's account to private means that only approved followers will be able to watch their videos.
- 3. **Restricted mode**This feature helps to filter out videos that may contain inappropriate or adult topics and stop them appearing on your child's 'For You Page'.
- 4. **Comment filters**Enable to manage who can comment on your child's videos and stop inappropriate comments from appearing on their feed.
- 5. Direct messages This can help them manage who can contact them privately on the app. You can choose who can send them direct messages by selecting 'Friends only' or 'No one'.
- 6. Daily screen time This setting allows you manage how long your child can spend on the app. You can set a daily time limit, and once it's up you'll need to enter a passcode to keep using the platform.


